The Year 9 cohort has had a fantastic 2010. The students have participated successfully in all facets of school life whether they are on campus or in extra-curricular activities.

This year was the start of the 2 year journey towards graduating high school. The students were assembled in the school hall very early on this year and addressed by the Principal, Phil Beecher. He explicitly informed them that, from that moment on, the results they receive will be forever recorded on their Year 10 Certificate. It came as a shock to some students and as a group it really hit home. They collectively realised that the 'junior' phase of their high school career was well and truly over and it was time to start 'senior' school.

We have seen many successes on the sporting fields this year. The Year 9 students have been an extremely talented group since Year 7 and that success has certainly not waned this year. The most pleasing aspect in regards to our sporting culture within this year group is the wonderful participation rate. We have managed to enter a team in every available sport across the school and that is purely due to the drive and school spirit of the students. Notable successes have been:

- The 'Year 9/10 Raiders Rugby League Knockout' where our girls finished undefeated premiers for the second year in a row and the boys made the semi-finals for the second year in a row.
- The girls '9/10 Bill Turner Competition' for soccer saw our girls team play in the major semi-final, losing narrowly by 1 goal to the eventual competition winners.
- North-side champions in the 'girls 9/10 Swan Cup' for Australian Rules.

This group has also had many notable successes academically across the school. The diversity of the year 9 cohort is what I believe to be its greatest strength. Participation in the English, Science and Math Competitions increased this year and we saw record numbers of not only participants but also of credit, distinction and high distinction grades. This year the students in year 9 had to participate in a term-long, ACT wide process called 'Exhibitions'. The students had to build a portfolio complete with a correctly formatted cover letter, 5 rationales, 6 self-reflection sheets and 5 pieces of work, from 3 different subject areas, that they considered to be 'their personal best'. This meant that students had the opportunity to show their hard work to a panel made up of teachers, parents and members of the public. Huge congratulations must go out the students for their amazing commitment, dedication and efficiency throughout this process. It was, by far, one of the most successful examples of the Exhibition process I have ever been involved with. Other notable successes include:

- ACT Champions in the 'Tournament of Minds'.
- Finalists in the 'Murray Debating Competition'.
- Record participation in the 'ACT Chess Tournament'.

The diversity of this year group was once again demonstrated through the talent of the students involved in the Arts. The Drama Production was again the pinnacle of the year long drama course at Canberra High. The students chose to perform a theatrical version of 'Peter Pan' which at first seemed like an impossibly difficult task. The students worked tirelessly with their teacher, Mrs Trudy Battye, to produce a first rate, professional, extremely funny, school play that was well received by the parents, teachers, primary schools, peers and members of the community. As well as the Drama Production there were many students involved in the Canberra High Showcase which ran simultaneously across the 2 opening nights. There were award winning photographs, artwork in the form of paintings, drawings and sculptures, immaculately designed projects from woodwork, metal work and jewellery maker, exquisitely presented projects that were completed in textiles and cooking and captivating videos and short films.

I have been looking forward to this group becoming the leaders of the school since their very first week of year 7. I believe they have the ability to set real and positive examples to their peers in the other grades and I hope they fulfil their potential next year. I have seen some of the potential of this group, not only through the examples I have already mentioned, but also on the recent year 9 camp to Tathra, the countless volunteers at school functions and charity events and the day to day behaviour around the school campus. I wish the entire year 9 cohort and their families a safe and happy holidays and I look forward to the students returning refreshed and ready to take on the responsibility of being the senior year group at Canberra High.

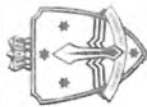
Year 8 - 2008

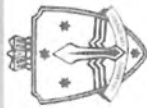



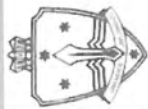

HARMONY DAY – MARCH 21, 2010

Students from Mr Chisholm's Power and Prejudice SOSE class led the school community in a day of reflection and harmony. This year's assembly continued the theme of overcoming cultural and racial intolerance by promoting respect, fairness and a sense of belonging for everyone. Canberra High's commitment to harmony in a culturally diverse school was brought about by a series of diverse cultural acts which received an overwhelming level of respect from a wonderful school audience.

At the classroom level the Power and Prejudice class learnt that Harmony Day coincides with the United Nations International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. This day is observed annually on 21 March. On that day, in 1960, police opened fire and killed 69 people at a peaceful demonstration in Sharpeville, South Africa, against the apartheid pass laws. Proclaiming the Day in 1966, the United Nations General Assembly called on the international community to redouble its efforts to eliminate all forms of racial discrimination. With this in mind and using the words of Mahatma Gandhi, who said: "If we wish to create a lasting peace we must begin with the children," it was thought most appropriate for the students to take ownership for the assembly.

At the whole school assembly, Cassie Fekete and Rhiannon Walters introduced the concept of Harmony Day and Noma Gudu and Linna Wei provided the historical background.

This year SOSE executive Shannon Carnovale came up with the fantastic idea of introducing student acts in both English and a foreign language. As a result the audience heard in excess of 10 foreign languages. The students and staff were treated to a range of acts including Zimbabwean singing, Irish Dancing, Spanish Guitar, Tongan archipelago, a contemporary French Dance and a Serbian song.

In addition to student acts the Arts and Lote Faculty also provided a number of class acts. These included Mr Yin's Year 10 class performing a Chinese song and Mrs Stewart's Year 10 class performing a French inspired culinary skit complete with snails and croissants. There was also a special presentation from the Canberra High Vocal group which treated the audience to two songs. The first was a Native American folk song. 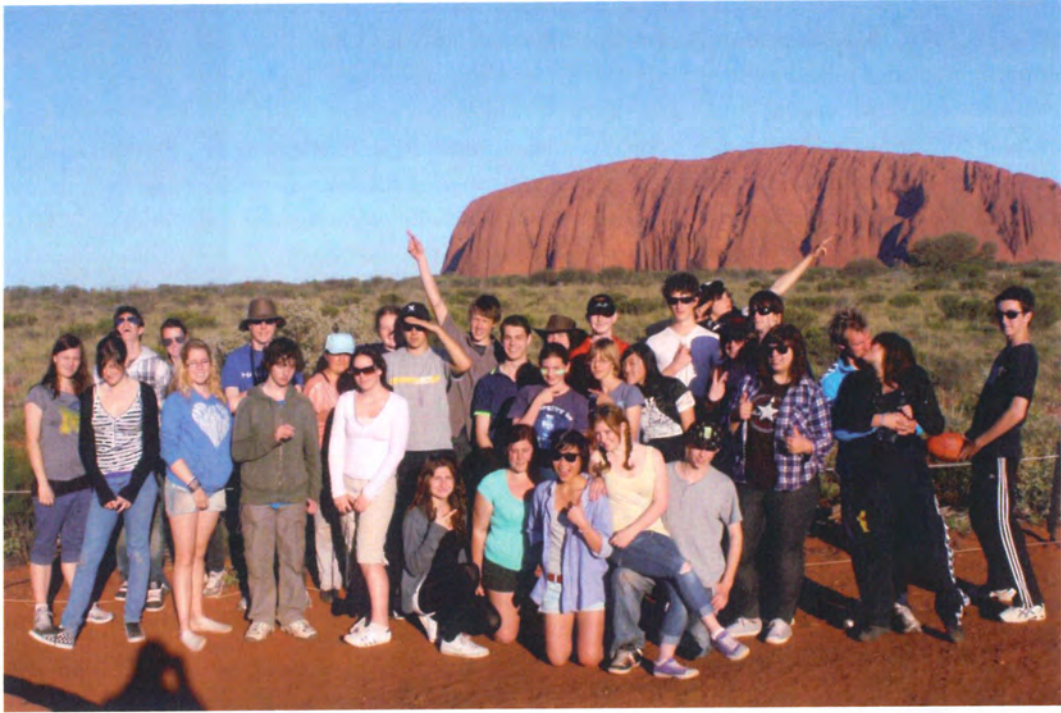

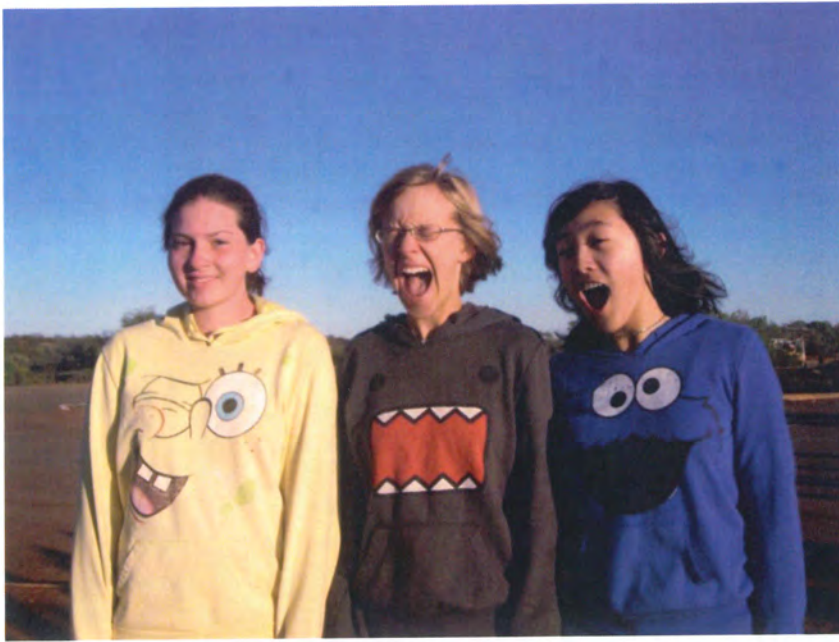

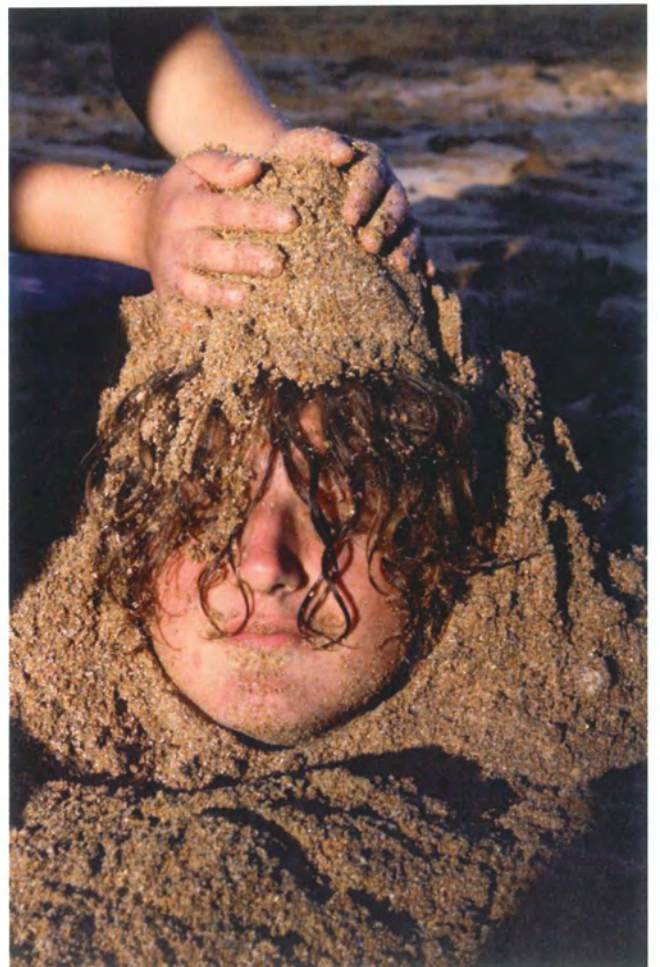
