NAPLAN Online is an engaging assessment that adjusts questions to each student's achievement level. It also delivers more precise results to parents and schools more quickly. NAPLAN provides valuable information to schools and parents about literacy and numeracy achievement. It supports school improvement processes by enabling teachers to monitor student progress over time and to identify areas of strength and development. All eligible students in Year 7 and 9 are encouraged and supported to participate in NAPLAN testing. 












New student and parent community resource libraries

Walk On Country

On 30 March a group of parents did a walk on country with Adam Shipp from Yurbay Consultancy. Adam led the group through part of Aranda bushlands to showcase some of the local plants and their traditional uses. We learnt about the healing properties of *Cassinia longifolia* (cauliflower bush) and how people used to take burls from the trees and carve sturdy containers from them. They could then use them to boil water in which to steep *Hardenbergia violacea* (false sarsaparilla) leaves for a calming tea. Adam spoke about many local edible summer fruits too.

CHS is planning to run another Walk on Country for those parents who missed out. Information will come soon.

Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs)

- If your child tests positive with a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT):
- they should isolate for 7 days and follow the guidance on the COVID-19 website, and
- register their positive RAT result with ACT Health using the online form, and
- tell your child's school if your child was at school during the time they may have been infectious.
- Registering a RAT result using the online form means ACT Health can contact you and provide further information and support if required.
- If your child has tested negative with a RAT but has ongoing COVID-19 symptoms, they should have a PCR test. If the PCR test is positive, they should follow the guidance for people with COVID-19. If the PCR test is negative, they may return to school when they are well.
- Household (high risk) contacts
- If your child is in quarantine because someone in your household has COVID-19, they cannot attend school during the quarantine time period. They are required to quarantine as a household (high risk) contact.
- As a household (high risk) contact, it's important that your child stays in quarantine for the full 7 days, even if they have returned an initial negative COVID-19 test during this time.
- Once your child has completed their quarantine period, they can return to school, if they do not have any symptoms of COVID-19, and have had a negative exit quarantine test. Information about children and COVID-19 is available on the ACT COVID-19 website.


Visual Arts

In year 10 visual art for semester one, our class was given the task of choosing an art movement to research and then creating a portrait using that style.



It is also an opportunity for Mr Crispin's Sound and Lighting crew and Music Industry course students to learn about setting up and mixing live sound.



Drama Workshop

This semester in the drama workshop we have been learning about Explorative Strategies, Mystery and Horror. Explorative Strategies are skills that can be used to improve a play such as cross-cutting, narration, thought-tracking and still image. We worked in small groups to create our own plays showcasing these strategies, with the final performances including stories from fairy tales, horror and murder mysteries. One story rewrote the ending of Hansel and Gretel to show that the children did not escape but were instead turned into gingerbread for the house. This has been a lot of fun.

We are currently exploring the genre of Mystery and Horror and the importance of using timing and tension to create suspense on stage. This has involved the class engaging in lots of role play through character cards and scripts. We also looked at the role of the Detective in Mystery, using clues to solve a crime and interrogating suspects. At the end of this week, we will be performing our self-devised Mystery plays and the class is eagerly waiting to see if they can solve the crime before the Detective in each performance.

LANGUAGES

French

In year 7 French, we learnt basic conversation skills and greetings. We worked on a French Collection assignment to showcase our work for parent-teacher night and open night. In this assignment we focused on our interests and passions about France.

In Year 10 French, we have been exploring reflexive verbs, talking about our morning routines, writing and speaking in the past tense, practising conversation in French, and studying French texts and stories.

In class we learn a mixture of culture, through movies and documentaries. We learnt about school life in France and France's school system. Every second Friday we have French conversations. While it is a small class, it is better because we can learn more.

Mandarin

The Year 7/8 students experienced different ways to learn Chinese vocabulary and grammar. We liked to know how a Chinese character has been evolved so that it can be easily memorised or connected to our lives. We were encouraged to use online resources to make our learning a fun journey. Learning Chinese songs and participating in the mini battle of houses have always been enjoyable.

For the Year 9/10 Mandarin classes, while we consistently practised our speaking, writing and reading skills, we have been exploring in depth the topics of occupation, nationalities, languages and families. We tried to focus on the usage of the language in a more comprehensive and consolidated way. We found the dictation task challenging but fun as we need to distinguish different sounds, make selections of lexis, constantly formulate expectancies concerning the incoming sounds and information based on our internalised grammar of the language, and record the speech in written forms as fast as we can.

Video Productions

This term of Video Production is in full swing! Students have just finished creating a video that showcases different film techniques, such as different angles and camera movements. We've learned a lot about the pre-production process which involves brainstorming, storyboarding, and scriptwriting. We've learned that planning is key to a successful shoot and that pressing the record button on a camera is only a part of the puzzle. The class is currently in the process of pre-production for our new task - a mock TV commercial promoting school affairs, such as the canteen or anti-littering. My production group is planning an advertisement for completing assignments on time. This task will let us demonstrate everything we've learned from the previous task, from storyboarding to editing. 


Photo media

Film Photography

The purpose of making these works is to practice the construction techniques we have been learning. Thanks to our teacher, Ms Daun, we have developed our skills and techniques very quickly.


Using the techniques we were taught, we all created pinch pots, and then had the choice to turn them into mugs, cups, pencil holders, or anything we could think of. We have all had a great time turning our pinch pot sketches into beautiful works of ceramics.

Recently, the ceramics course has been expanded with extra units added to build on our knowledge. The first few students who have taken this opportunity are working with Ms Daun to move beyond the basics to more sophisticated techniques. We are working with moulds to create shallow bowls and trialling surface treatments.

We have started the design process for our next large project, a story tile. This will be a large square with a story that has meaning to us. Once we finish designing the tile we will work on the project in the ceramics room.

The ceramics room is always filled with laughter and collaboration to create a productive working environment. Sometimes it is a calm area where we relax and is the perfect environment for creative ideas. We love it!



Information Technology

They are now working on skills to develop corporate materials including letters. The assessments are open which some students find a challenge however it also allows students scope to take their assessment in any direction:

Keyboarding and Office skills

Students are enjoying the competitive environment of touch typing while resisting some teacher influence to get hands in the right position and perhaps to focus on accuracy as well as speed. The office skills are developing with some students demonstrating excellent engagement with file protocols.



MATHS

As the end of the term approaches, so do assessment deadlines. This week, all students have been completing their term tests. After this, new topics will be introduced to finish off the term. Year 7 will be learning statistics, Year 8 will be studying index laws, Year 9 will be learning binomial expansion, and Year 10 will be working on inequalities.

Mathematics Challenge is starting in week 9. Entries have closed but students can still sign up for the Mathematics Enrichment competition. Inspire students must do at least one of these programs. The Computational and Algorithmic Thinking (CAT) competition is on the 4th of May. CAT is an hour-long competition, which is designed to encourage curiosity and promote algorithmic and computational learning. Students don't need any prior computer programming knowledge or skills to participate. Forms and payments are due on the 8th of April. Students can talk to their Maths teacher or Mr Martyn Call for more information.


SCIENCE

AWM Story

A box of World War II uniforms and items were sent by the Australian War Memorial for a showcasing to the Year 10 history classes at Canberra High. Students had the opportunity to examine the artifacts and try on the uniforms.

The different items were primarily used in the Pacific Theatre where Australia and Allied Countries were fighting against Imperial Japan. The items included a Japanese Slipper, made for tough terrain in the swamps of Papua New Guinea, and a metal helmet used for protection. This helmet was quite heavy, which made it awkward to wear. However, a few of the hats with both Allied and Imperial Japanese origins were quite comfortable to wear. There were also authentic medals that were given to soldiers. There were four different outfits including a Soldier's outfit, a RAAF outfit, a sailor's outfit and a Japanese hat.

They had different levels of comfort and usage, for example the RAAF outfit was itchy and uncomfortable, because of the materials that were used in crafting the outfit. Some other things in the box included a silk printed naval map, and a handbook for bomb shelter wardens.

STUDENT SERVICES

Skateboard Artwork Design Group

The Skateboard Creative Artwork Design Group was recently completed by a small number of Year 9 students, as a pilot program at the end of 2021. Students expressed an interest in artwork, spray and hand painting & skateboards and were responsible for coming up with a suitable artwork design that could be transferred to the underside of a blank skateboard deck. This program has received extra funding and is continuing this year.
